

TOUR REPORT

SUMMER GRAND VENEZUELA

June 11-29 1999

Leader: David Ascanio E.

This list includes all the birds seen or heard on the Summer Grand Venezuela Trip. Rains were almost absent and did allow us to have a remarkable experience in the Llanos.

It is special to point out the great wildlife at Hato El Cedral, the 28 species of Hummingbirds, the 12 species of Wrens, the Banana splashed over my face, the 30 species of Tanagers and the most strange names for a given birding spot of any of my previous tour.

There is no much we know about birds on this time of the year. The sighting of Plumbeous Kite in San Pablo, the enormous number of Orange-fronted Yellow-finches in Hato El Cedral and the absence of Black-chested Buzzard-Eagle in Santo Domingo Paramo (could suggest that this species was nesting), I believe they are situations yet to be reported to science.

It was my pleasure to be your leader. I hope to see you on another trip. Hopefully on our Bird Banding Workshop or in one of the Southeastern Venezuela Tours!

Organizations of this Report

This report includes 3 columns of information. The first one indicates the total number of species seen. If the species was only heard will be indicated with an "H". The second one indicates the regions where it was reported according to the abbreviations used below, and the third column indicates detailed or interesting information about the species. When a given species have been seen and heard, the last information is mentioned in the third column.

Please note that this report follows mostly the nomenclature of De Schauensee and Phelps in "A Guide to the Birds of Venezuela" with few up-dates from Ridgely & Tudor "The Birds of South America". When there is a new english name for a given species, the previous one will be found written into brackets.

The common names in italic means recent splits or discoveries within the boundaries of Venezuela.

The following abbreviations are used in this report:

(CC) Coastal Cordillera:

Colonia Tovar (Puerto Cruz Road), Macarao National Park, Henri Pittier National Park (Rancho Grande, Choroní Road, Ocumare Road).

(FL) States of Falcon, Yaracuy and Lara:

Cuare Wildlife Refuge, Morrocoy National Park, Cerro La Mision, Cerro Chichiriviche, San Pablo Marshes and Dessert Scrub of Lara.

(AD) Andes of Merida and Trujillo

Guaramacal National Park, Sierra Nevada National Park, Altamira, Boconoito, Santo Domingo Paramo and San Isidro buffer zone.

(LL) Llanos of Apure and Barinas State.

Hato El Cedral (Matiyure River, Caicara River, Sabanas de Aroa medio), San Silvestre and Santa Ines.
